

SITE UPDATES

National CCCM Cluster

Following extensive consultation with partners and beneficiaries, the Cluster finalized and endorsed the 2017 CCCM Response Strategy, which was presented to donors. In addition to maintaining operational presence in formal camps, the strategy emphasizes supporting national NGOs and civil society organizations (such as churches) to build their capacity to provide required temporary CCCM response at point of displacement as such providing for faster return of IDPs to their normal lives upon improvement of security situations. This approach supports IDP choice in their displacement, facilitates return and transition, and avoids concentrating resources exclusively in large formal camps.

Wau *Wau PoC* 169 *Wau PoC AA* 31,527 *Collective Centers* 14,891

PoCAA: To reduce congestion and increase the health and safety of Wau PoCAA, CCCM undertook a major site rehabilitation of tightly packed Zone A. CCCM leveled ground, installed roads, sanitation, and drainage, and is relocating families from informal shelters to newly constructed longhouses.

Collective Sites: Following successful leadership elections that reformed governance structures for more proportional representation, CCCM trained and supported new camp governance in the selection of a Executive Camp Committee with block leaders, women, and youth represented.

Bentiu *Bentiu PoC* 114,683 *Bentiu Collective centres* 2,079

PoC: A market dispute led to a spontaneous outbreak of community violence in the PoC that suspended site activities for security reasons. IOM CCCM responded with emergency conflict resolution, reconciliation, and de-escalation activities including meetings and direct consultations with affected parties, camp governance, and community elders. Through these and community efforts, the situation was resolved peacefully and CCCM activities resumed with the inauguration of new leadership.

Malakal PoC *Malakal PoC* 30,551

Camp Management and IOM DTM completed a general population headcount to enable partners to right size services and track population trends within the site.

The upgrading and maintenance of site drainage is proceeding on schedule as the rainy season intensifies. Newly installed drainage functioned as designed during these first large rains.

Aburoc *Aburoc IDP site* 10,298

With the approach of the rainy season and high risk of flooding, CCCM is conducted a house-to-house campaign to warn residents and explore options for relocation out of flood-prone areas.

CCCM has taken the first steps towards formalizing governance structures within the camp through community consultations and engagement with traditional leadership structures.

Bor PoC *Bor PoC* 2,383

After unexploded munitions were found in the buffer zone around the PoC, CCCM alerted the United Nations Mine Action Service (UNMAS) and mobilized the community to participate in UNMAS risk awareness sessions.

UN House PoC *UN House PoCs* 38,448

Campaigning for CCCM-organized governance and site committee elections are underway. To support these structures' effectiveness upon inauguration, CCCM is meeting with partners to discuss roles, required support, and opportunities for coordination.

Kajo Keji informal settlements *Kajo Keji Sites* 30,000

Food security continues to be an issue in the area, partly due to humanitarian access constraints; the Diocese of Kajo Keji continues to distribute maize to vulnerable households. Education provision is a challenge with schools operating on a voluntary basis. CCCM agencies (ACTED and HL) have begun the establishment of community structures to ease coordination, community representation and participation at the IDP sites.
