

SITE UPDATES

National CCCM Cluster

In case of a crisis and worst case scenario as experienced in July 2016, the national Cluster continues its support for contingency planning in the POC sites for a timely and continued response while working closely with UNMISS and OCHA in case of limitations in access, or influx to, the sites. This includes pre-positioning of supplies, and facilitation of humanitarian agencies' activities.

Wau

In an effort to improve community representation and leadership accountability, leadership elections in the Cathedral have been conducted. In each of five blocks, one Block Leader and Deputy, one Woman Leader and Deputy, and one Youth Leader and Deputy have been elected. These elected persons will form a 'General Assembly' through which the Camp Management Committee will be selected. The ToR for the committees will be developed with the community and new leadership. ACTED is installing solar lights to avert protection risks at the sites during the night and to enable women and girls feel safe during the night.

Bentiu

Bentiu PoC **115,670**

The recent trend of increasing security incidents within the sites continues. While advocacy for mitigation measures such as increasing security patrolling in the site is underway, financing repair of the berm and perimeter fence has become an urgent priority. High congestion, and occupation of alternative space options including communal shelters, churches, and verandas by new arrivals, continues to exacerbate tensions and increase protection risks in the site.

Malakal PoC

Malakal PoC **30,551**

New arrivals to Malakal POC continue to increase on a weekly basis, with few exits. New communal shelters are being constructed to accommodate the families, but space is extremely limited and over-crowding continues to be of major concern for the whole population.

Aburoc

Aburoc IDP site **10,298**

Access between the two sites across the river is a significant challenge with the onset of rainy season, while drainage works are underway to improve surface water run-off and reduce likelihood of flooding within the blocks. Service desks have been established in the site, as a first step in implementing a new CwC strategy.

Bor PoC

Bor PoC **2,383**

Drainages rehabilitation has finally commenced with the support of UNMISS, with pumps being used to drain standing water outside the POC. Following influx of new arrivals from conflict-affected and food insecure northern Jonglei in the last months, construction of communal shelters to accommodate 100 individuals currently staying in community centres will commence next week, to be used as transit spaces until individual shelters can be identified for those who will stay in the POC, or until families choose to leave.

UN House PoC

UN House PoCs **38,448**

The CCCM team has identified 1,059 new arrivals living in a vocational training centre or in communal shelters. Working with the Shelter partner, individual shelters will be constructed in remaining available plots to accommodate as many families as possible in more dignified circumstances, and communal shelters will be used as transit spaces. Renovation and relocation of the POC1 market strip is planned to improve safety and road accessibility.

Kajo Keji informal settlements

Kajo Keji Sites **30,000**

Food security continues to be an issue in the area, partly due to humanitarian access constraints; the Diocese of Kajo Keji continues to distribute maize to vulnerable households. Education provision is a challenge with schools operating on a voluntary basis. CCCM agencies (ACTED and HL) have begun the establishment of community structures to ease coordination, community representation and participation at the IDP sites.
